CROP Hunger Walk

The annual CROP Hunger Walk at Twin Lakes occurred on a beautiful October morning. Sponsored by the Residents' Association, this year's event was dedicated to the memory of Mary Ann and Larry Dettman, who organized the Twin Lakes Walk for 14 years. As in previous years, participants gathered at the Boland Community Center before embarking on a 1-mile loop around the east side of the campus. The Twin Lakes Residents' Association, a consistent major sponsor of the CROP Walk, raised an impressive \$14,372 for local, national, and global agencies working to combat hunger. This year, 159 participants, including 95 walkers, joined the efforts to reduce hunger and poverty "one step at a time."

A Night to Remember

In January 2024, a small group of

residents gathered to discuss forming a theatre group, later known as Twin Lakes Community Players. Some participants had years of experience performing in community theater across the country, while others had not been on stage since high school. Ultimately, the group decided that experience did not matter; they were all in this together. The group aimed to perform for a live audience while having fun themselves, emphasizing the joy of collaboration to bring the stage to life.

The first few weeks together focused on shaking off the rust. The group held table reads of scripts written for senior actors. They practiced engaging warm-ups, worked on voice projection, and rehearsed monologues. During this time, one member quietly began writing her own script. Becky Clark, a resident since 2022, created humorous dialogues featuring couples who misunderstood one another due to differences in their speech — one using street slang and the other employing highbrow vocabulary. Her fictional world came to life when the group decided to launch a variety show showcasing their works along with the talents of other

residents from across campus.

In October, the group performed a short comedy titled "No Frills Airplane," along with Clark's "A Play on Words" and two monologues. Dinny Sisley, a resident since 2014, introduced the audience to slam poetry with her original and powerful poem, "Death Throes." Rounding out the production, an offshoot group of the Twin Lakes choir called "The Tees Bees" (short for Tenors and Bases), performed two songs. Their rendition of "Bring Him Home" from Les Misérables left not a dry eye in the room.

The evening was filled with both laughter and tears. The show ignited excitement and encouragement among its audience reminding them they are never too old to play and make new friends and now they eagerly anticipate the next production, scheduled for Spring of 2025!

Twin Lakes Values Intergenerational Connections

Twin Lakes Community encourages opportunities for intergenerational relationships, recognizing that they benefit everyone involved. Through these efforts, resident volunteers have engaged with students to provide tutoring, job skills, mentorship, and scholarship opportunities. These connections help to foster meaningful relationships that ultimately bridge the gap between different age groups.

This summer, at the initiative of resident Judy
Harrow, Twin Lakes launched a new program, Students
& Seniors Community Conversations. In this initiative,
residents were paired with students from the local
community, creating opportunities for mutual learning
and engagement across generations. The student
participants were a diverse group, ranging from high
schoolers to college and graduate students. The goal of
the program was to cultivate a supportive and inclusive
environment where intergenerational friendships could

thrive. The meet-ups were filled with lively, spirited conversations, with many participants exchanging contact information to continue nurturing these relationships long after the formal events.

Shenandoah University senior, Jack Hardman, interned at Twin Lakes this summer and was instrumental in the program's development. He shared the following thoughts about his experience:

"From the very first gathering, I could see something special unfolding – these moments of connection weren't just conversations – they were bridges being built across generations, filled with mutual respect and genuine curiosity. Residents told me how much they loved having their perspectives heard and seeing the enthusiasm of the students, who themselves came away with

a deeper understanding of life's many twists and turns. This program was a reminder of the strength, wisdom, and kindness that this community embodies, and I am truly honored to have been a part of it."

Thanks to the dedication of all involved, Students & Seniors Community Conversations joined other successful campus efforts to engage residents and young people together and encourage a sense of connection and understanding.
